**SUBJECT: RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2009-10 CITY GENERAL FUND AND
WORKFORCE INVESTMENT ACT (WIA) AMERICAN RECOVERY AND
REINVESTMENT ACT (ARRA) SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM
(SYEP) ALLOCATIONS**

The Community Development Department (CDD) released the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) Request for Proposals (RFP) to create a list of qualified organizations to provide subsidized summer employment services to low-income youth. The RFP stated that the source of funds would be "... anticipated City General Purpose funds. In addition, the City hopes to continue to receive County funds to serve youth in the area where City and County jurisdictions overlap. There is also the possibility of future Federal funds for summer youth employment becoming available and it is the intent of the City to utilize the list resulting from this RFP to allocate those funds."

CDD has received preliminary confirmation of a 2009 City General Fund allocation as well as an allocation of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds targeted for summer youth employment activities. It is important to note, the City of Los Angeles has not received notification of continued Summer Youth Jobs funding from the County of Los Angeles.

On May 8, 2009 a public notice of the organizations qualified through the RFP process was released, along with A Letter of Intent to Participate in SYEP. Responses, including the requested distribution of participants by percentage within City planning areas, were due Monday, May 11, 2009 by 5 PM.

After a review of the requests, CDD recommends the funding allocations that appear on the attached table. All funding recommendations are contingent upon approval by the Mayor, City Council and Workforce Investment Board through the Annual Plan.
